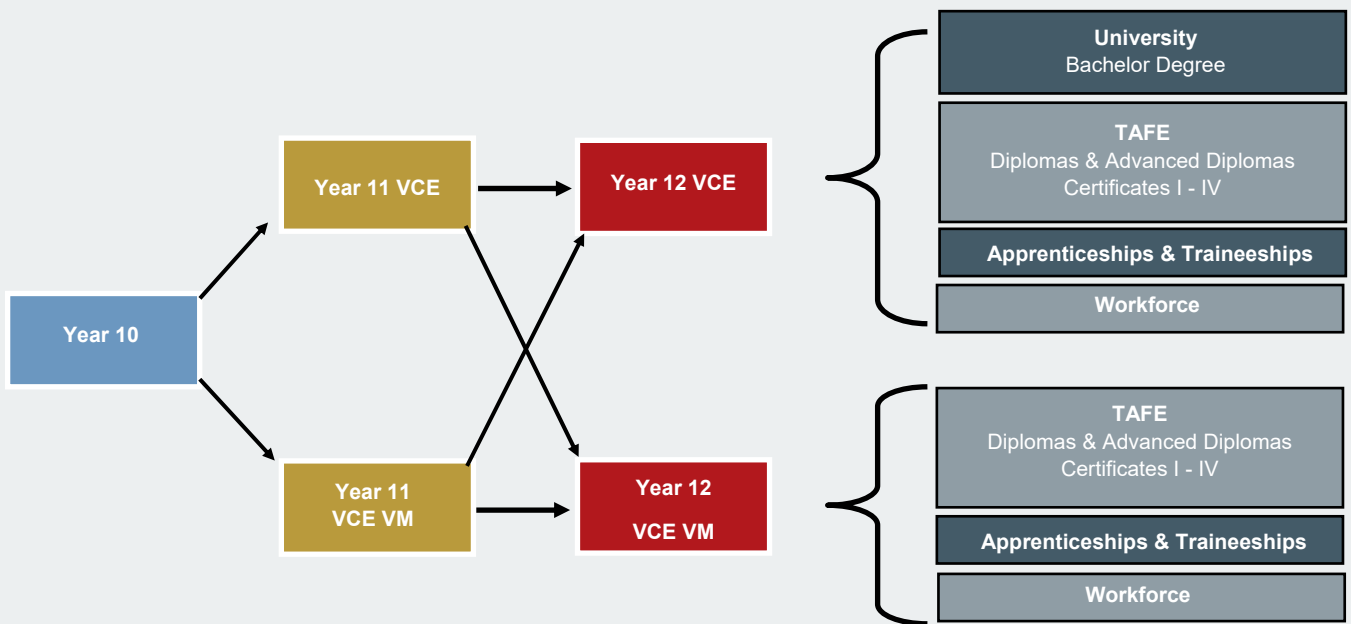




Year 10 Individual Student Pathways

At Year 10, a combination of subject choices enables our students to consolidate their learning, begin to specialise and investigate new subjects in a range of learning areas. The Year 10 curriculum at Buckley Park College is designed to provide curriculum breadth, and personalised learning pathways, for all students.

A rich, diverse and stimulating range of educational opportunities will be provided to students. It is acknowledged that Year 10 begins students' learning as members of the Later Years sub-school. Students will be challenged to extend their learning in a variety of ways and may have the opportunity to study 1 or more VCE subject/s in Year 10, depending on the selection process.





Year 10 Mainstream Students

1. Students must choose:
 - 2 x Units of English | 2 x Units of Mathematics | 1 x Unit of Science
 - 1 x Unit of Humanities | 1 x Unit of Physical Education
2. Students then choose their additional units of study from:
 - 2.1 VCE Unit: Students may apply to do a VCE subject, from the list published. Students must meet the set enrolment criteria.
 - 2.2 Elective Units: Then students elect their other Units from the various Domain offerings. Their VCE subject choice may replace a Year 10 Unit.
(For example, if Jane decides to do VCE History in Year 10, then she will no longer need to do Year 10 Humanities)
 - 2.3 Languages are taken for the whole year. Students choose their language during the enrolment phase and continue the same language for 3 years or beyond. Students then select elective Units from a range of Domains, guided through the counselling process. These choices will depend on whether they have a VCE sequence and the subsequent amount of Year 10 Units to be selected. The counselling team will work with students to ensure that a broad learning program is studied.

VCE

Satisfactory Completion of the Victorian Certificate of Education VCE

To attain the Victorian Certificate of Education, students must, over a minimum of two years, satisfactorily complete at least 16 units of study, of which at least 3 must be English. They must also include at least three Unit 3 & 4 sequences other than English.

Year 10

At Buckley Park College, Year 10 students may elect to study:

- One unit 1 & 2 VCE subject

(NB: Criteria must be met for enrolment into an accelerated VCE study)

Year 11

At Buckley Park College, Year 11 students will study:

- English units 1 & 2 and:
- Five other unit 1 & 2 subjects or where applicable units 3 & 4 subjects

(NB: Criteria must be met for enrolment into an accelerated VCE study)

Year 12

If a student has completed one 3 and 4 unit in Year 11 they will still be required to enrol and complete subjects in Year 12.

At the time of course counselling all students will be required to choose 5 Unit 3-4 subjects.

At Buckley Park College, Year 12 students will study:

- One of English units 3 & 4 and:
- Four other units 3 & 4

At Buckley Park College, Year 12 students who have already successfully completed two units 3 & 4 will study:

- One of English units 3 & 4 and:
- Three other units 3 & 4

Study Scores

In order to qualify for a Study Score, a student must have satisfactorily completed units 3 & 4 in that study. Students' overall achievements for each study will be calculated by the VCAA and reported as a Study Score (relative position) on a scale of 0 to 50.

ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank)

The ATAR is determined at the end of Year 12 to assist tertiary institutions to select students. An aggregate is calculated by taking the English Study Score, the next 3 best Study Scores and 10% of the next 2 Study Scores. The aggregates are ranked and the ranking from 99.95 down is the ATAR. Virtual School Victoria

In extenuating circumstances, students may apply to complete a VCE subject through the Virtual School of Victoria (VSV). At VSV students learn through online courses, real-time online classes, and face-to-face communication.

In order to be eligible for studying at the VSV the following criteria apply;

- The student is unable to study the subject at school due to a timetable clash.
- College is unable to provide a suitably qualified teacher in the subject.

Victorian Certificate of Education Vocational Major (VCE VM)

The Victorian Certificate of Education Vocational Major (VCE VM) is broadening the educational, training and employment opportunities for students who are more suited to learning in an applied, practical environment. VCE VM gives students practical work-related experience, further literacy and numeracy skills and the chance to build personal skills that are integral in work-life.

Students who study VCE VM are likely to be interested in going on to training at TAFE, undertaking a Certificate IV or Diploma course, doing an apprenticeship, or getting a job after completing Year 12.

VCE VM is underpinned by the following curriculum principles:

- Student-centred approaches and decision-making regarding program design, delivery and evaluation
- Opportunities for experiential learning and skill development through activities that are structured and sequential in their learning outcomes
- Programs that are relevant to personal strengths and experiences, and that are responsive to the diverse needs of students
- Programs that build resilience, confidence and a sense of self-worth
- Learning environments that strengthen connections with the community
- Programs that allow students to enter and exit at each level to pursue a range of pathway options

VCE VM is designed to develop and extend pathways for young people. On completion of VCE VM, students will be able to make informed choices about employment or education pathways.

Entry Requirements

- In order to study the VCE VM, students are required to have completed Year 10 or Year 11 at Buckley Park College
- Students must submit a Vocational Major application outlining their suitability and their desired pathway. Students who apply are not guaranteed a place in the course
- Students may be required to complete an interview to secure their position in Vocational Major.
- Students must demonstrate they have met the behavioural expectations (this will be communicated with parents in Year 10) prior to the subject counselling process. The VM course allows students to be in the Workplace and attend VET courses in which they will be representing the College. Students also need to demonstrate the ability to work with other students, work in community projects where trust and responsibility are key elements



VCE VM students will study subjects at BPC three days per week, attend a Vocational Education and Training (VET) course of their choice one day per week and work in the workplace one day per week.

1 day per week at VET:

Substantial course costs are associated with VET programs. The government and the school provide a subsidy towards these costs and parents of VCE VM students are required to contribute a fee but are yet to be determined by the Department of Education and Training.

1 day a week at WORK:

In 2024, work placements run for 20 weeks maximum. Students must arrange a second work placement for Semester 2. Students are required to have organised their WORK and VET Placements by the final day of the Orientation Program:

Year 12 2025: Friday 24 NOV Year 11 2025: Thursday 30 NOV

NB: If students have not finalised their placements by the above dates they are required to attend school until a placement has been secured.



Planning your Course and Subject Selection

For most students, especially those unsure of their career direction, a good guide for subject selection is to choose subjects you enjoy and are successful in. A good course will embrace a wide range of subject areas, while being mindful of tertiary prerequisites.

1. What career(s) do you have in mind? Leading up to and during your time in Later Years you should take advantage of opportunities available to you to consider your future. Attend Open Days at tertiary institutions and take full advantage of the Careers Expo organised at the College so that your choices will be well reasoned ones. *If you have no idea for career direction you are advised to see the College's Career & VCE VM Leader, Andrea Medic.*
2. Investigate the tertiary courses and/ or pathways that might lead to your chosen career.
3. Establish whether any studies are required for entries into such tertiary programs: For university requirements you should consult the Victorian Tertiary Entrance Requirements (VICTER), available on the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre (VTAC) website: [VTAC YEAR 10](#) and [VTAC YEAR 11](#)
4. Discuss possible career directions and subject choices with your parents before attending your counselling meeting.
5. If you are in Year 11 or Year 12 in 2024 before or at your counselling meeting decide whether you wish to enrol in VCE or VCE VM.

Year 10 / VCE

1. Ensure you include subjects that are prerequisites for any career interests.
2. Complete the remaining choices with subjects that are of interest, those in which you would expect to do well.
3. Take your subject selection form home to review.
4. Return the subject selection form by the due date in order to have your choices considered when the timetable grid is constructed.

VCE VM

1. Consider your VET selection.
2. Consider your Work Placement.
3. Take your VCE VM selection form home to review.
4. Return the VCE VM selection form by the due date.

After all courses have been submitted, the Later Years Coordinator will produce a subject timetable grid that provides the best courses possible to all students. We do all we can to accommodate the greatest number of student selections.

The Years 10, 11 and 12 program is determined on the basis of student choices. The program is constructed in order to maximise the ability of students to get their subject choices, within the resource available to the College. During this process some students may require re-counselling: e.g. - where subjects are in the same block of the grid. Once the timetable grid has been established students will receive a confirmed course for the year 2024.
